## vec of a Partitioned Matrix

DateDateDate
Let $\boldsymbol{A}$ and $\boldsymbol{B}$ be the usual matrix of the sizes, ( rax cb ), and ( rbx cb ), resp.
Assume that ra $=$ rb.
Horizontally augumented partitioned matrix of size ( $\mathrm{rax}(\mathrm{ca}+\mathrm{cb}$ )).

$$
\begin{equation*}
C=(A, B) \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

The vec of $\boldsymbol{C}$ is

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{C})=\binom{\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{A})}{\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{B})} \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now, assuming ca $=\mathrm{cb}$, consider the vertically augumented partitioned matrix of size ((ra+rb) x ca).

$$
\begin{equation*}
D=\binom{\boldsymbol{A}}{\boldsymbol{B}} \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

Note that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{D}) \neq\binom{\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{A})}{\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{B})} \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

The vec of $\boldsymbol{D}$ can be expressed as follows using the commutation matrix. The commutation matrix $K_{c a, r a}$ is defined as the matrix with which the relationship

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{A})=K_{c a, r a} \operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{A}^{\prime}\right) \tag{5}
\end{equation*}
$$

is true.
Using this, we have

$$
\begin{align*}
\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{D}) & =K_{c d, r d} \operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{D}^{\prime}\right)  \tag{6}\\
& =K_{c d, r d} \operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{A}^{\prime}, \boldsymbol{B}^{\prime}\right)  \tag{7}\\
& =K_{c d, r d}\binom{\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{A}^{\prime}\right)}{\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{B}^{\prime}\right)} \tag{8}
\end{align*}
$$

Now partition the rows of $K_{c a, r a}$ into two blocks as

$$
K_{c a, r a}=\left[\begin{array}{l}
K 1  \tag{9}\\
K 2
\end{array}\right]
$$

Then, we have

$$
\begin{align*}
\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{D}) & =K_{c d, r d} \operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{D}^{\prime}\right)  \tag{10}\\
& =\left[\begin{array}{c}
K 1 \\
K 2
\end{array}\right]\binom{\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{A}^{\prime}\right)}{\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{B}^{\prime}\right)}  \tag{11}\\
& =\left(\begin{array}{c}
K 1\left(\begin{array}{c}
\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{A}^{\prime}\right) \\
\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{B}^{\prime}\right) \\
\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{A}^{\prime}\right) \\
\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{B}^{\prime}\right)
\end{array}\right)
\end{array}\right) \tag{12}
\end{align*}
$$

This is what we get as we use vecK $[\boldsymbol{D}]$.
Now partition the columns of $K_{c a, r a}$ into two blocks as

$$
K_{c a, r a}=\left[\begin{array}{ll}
K 3 & K 4 \tag{13}
\end{array}\right]
$$

Then, we have

$$
\begin{align*}
\operatorname{vec}(\boldsymbol{D}) & =K_{c d, r d} \operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{D}^{\prime}\right)  \tag{14}\\
& =\left[\begin{array}{cc}
K 3 & K 4
\end{array}\right]\binom{\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{A}^{\prime}\right)}{\operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{B}^{\prime}\right)}  \tag{15}\\
& =\left(K 3 \operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{A}^{\prime}\right)+K 4 \operatorname{vec}\left(\boldsymbol{B}^{\prime}\right)\right) \tag{16}
\end{align*}
$$

This may be more compact.
